

## Roosevelt Road improvements underway

**W**ork to improve the streetscape and walkability of Roosevelt Road is now underway, as efforts focus on creating a more pedestrian-friendly, landscaped and vibrant commercial corridor along the busy thoroughfare shared by Oak Park, Berwyn and Cicero.

Work started at Harlem Avenue and will move east to Austin Boulevard in three phases — Harlem to Oak Park Avenue, Oak Park to Ridgeland Avenue and Ridgeland to Austin. Construction is expected to be completed by August 2011.

The project includes new sidewalks, curbs, streetlights and garbage cans, as well as extensive landscaping with trees and planters. Curb bump outs also are planned to create spaces for new benches.

Initial groundwork for the project was laid in 2000 with an Illinois Tomorrow Grant to develop general guidelines for improving the Roosevelt Road corridor. That plan, released in 2003, recom-



mended that the three communities adopt a shared vision and unified regulations to make it possible.

The three communities signed an intergovernmental agreement in 2006 pledging to work together to revitalize their shared border. Specific design plans for streetscape improvements and new consistent zoning regulations for all three communities were authorized in 2007, and zoning regulations approved in 2009.

On Sat., Oct. 30, the drop-off is from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. Both collection events will be at the Public Works Center, near Lombard Avenue and South Boulevard. Residents must unload their own items at the September event, but help will be available at the October collection. Acceptable items include computers, peripherals, laptops, monitors, TVs, cell phones, rechargeable batteries, printers, fax machines, MP3 players, portable digital assistants, video game consoles, videocassette recorders/players, digital videodisk players, zip drives and scanners. ## Bond refinancing to save taxpayers \$2.16 million

**W**hen the Village Board recently approved two ordinances to issue bonds, most observers may have either missed the action entirely or saw the vote as routine government business. But to taxpayers, the vote will mean a savings of more than \$2.16 million by the time the bonds mature. The votes were not to issue new bonds, but to consolidate and refinance earlier issues to take advantage of lower interest rates. Like a homeowner refinancing a mortgage, the Village was able to reduce the interest rates to less than 3 percent and significantly lower the payments and cost of the bonds that are set to mature in 2015 and 2020. Governments, like property owners, often must borrow money to pay for major capital expenditures. The lower the interest rate, the lower the payments and the less that is paid when the bonds mature. Officials say the refinancing effort also demonstrated that the Village's bond rating — the grade lenders look to when determining a government's financial health — has remained high despite the difficult economic times of the past three years. The refinancing will save the Village about \$700,000 on a bond for \$7.7 million set to mature in 2015, and about \$1.5 million on a \$14 million bond set to mature in 2020. Officials say that although the savings from the refinancing are helpful, the Village must continue to be cautious in this economy. Euclid Ave., near the corner of Harrison Street

and Oak Park Avenue; in the Avenue Garage at Oak Park Avenue and North Boulevard; and in the Holley Court Garage downtown, just north of Lake Street near Marion Street. ## Community service teaches juveniles important lessons

**H**ow do you get a juvenile who has run afoul of a local law to understand the error of his or her way? Have them spend Saturdays picking up litter. At least that's what the Village of Oak Park's Office of Administrative Adjudication hopes is the case. Almost every adjudication docket in Oak Park includes at least one or two juveniles who have violated a local ordinance, such as being on the streets after curfew, fighting, disturbing the peace or underage drinking. Any of these violations could carry a stiff fine — \$750 to \$1,000. But in Oak Park, where violations that don't rise to the level of possible jail time are handled administratively rather than through the county circuit court, officials hope community service sentences are more effective than fines in changing behavior. Typically, community service penalties are handed down in four-hour increments. The more severe the violation, the more hours of community service the administrative law judge may require of the juvenile. Initially, community service tasks have been limited to duties such as picking up litter and washing municipal vehicles, such as police cars, tasks where the juveniles can be closely monitored to ensure their safety. Community service is not a new option for the adjudication process in Oak Park. But with the closing of the local Volunteer Center, the Village is bringing part of the program in-house where the types of service can be more closely monitored and tasks tied to generating a tangible benefit to the community. ## State's Attorney opens new office in Oak Park

**A** large and enthusiastic group of elected officials, police, clergy and activists gathered on Chicago Avenue near Austin Boulevard recently to celebrate the re-opening of a community prosecution office. Called a *Community Justice Center*, the office will be staffed by assistant state's attorneys and a community outreach coordinator who will work closely with police, community groups, schools, businesses and residents to prevent and prosecute local crime. The center also will coordinate and host informational seminars and crime prevention meetings. A specially trained prosecutor from the State's Attorney's Mortgage Fraud Investigations and Prosecution Unit will work at the center to assist area residents affected by mortgage fraud. In addition, the center will offer resources to help crime victims access ongoing court information and obtain additional services of the State's Attorney's victim witness unit. Oak Park Police Chief Rick Tanksley called the new office, which also houses a police department sub-station, a blessing for the community, emphasizing the partnership between the Oak Park Police and the city's 15th police district, which serves the nearby Austin neighborhood. **Avoid license plate fraud...** If you have accumulated numerous parking tickets on a vehicle you no longer own, you could be the victim of license plate fraud. After selling, trading or donating a vehicle and not transferring the plate, always contact the Illinois Secretary of State and cancel your license plate — just call 800.252.8980 or visit [www.cyberillinois.com](http://www.cyberillinois.com).

**Check the ticket...** If you find a ticket on your vehicle, make sure it is yours. Unscrupulous individuals have been known to take the ticket from their vehicle and place it on another vehicle hoping that owner will not look at the ticket detail and pay it. So, be sure to read the vehicle description before assuming it is yours.

**Deadlines, deadlines...** How long does one have to contest or appeal a ticket? The Village must receive the appeal within 14 days of the date the citation was issued. Tickets issued in Oak Park may be contested in writing or in-person. Written appeals also can be filed online at [www.oak-park.us/onlineservices](http://www.oak-park.us/onlineservices).

## Verify contractor status online

**V**erifying the status of a contractor's license and insurance is just a click away. A feature on the Village website at [www.oak-park.us/onlineservices](http://www.oak-park.us/onlineservices) searches the Building & Property Standards permit tracking database to determine if a contractor's credentials with the Village are up to date, a step that can help avoid unnecessary delays at the permit counter since a contractor's license and insurance must be current for a permit to be issued. The Village does not recommend contractors for any work or provide an opinion on a contractor's past performance. Any contractor who provides the proper documentation may register with the Building & Property Standards Department to perform work within the Village. ## Local programs offer ways to showcase property's history



Oak Parkers proud of their own piece of architectural heritage can showcase their property by participating in local programs that offer preservation advice, opportunities to earn tax relief and incentives, and plaques to let their neighbors know how special the property has become. Villagers can apply for historic landmark designation through the Oak Park Historic Preservation Commission. If landmark status is approved, owners can receive professional advice to ensure the preservation of their property, as well as the potential for property tax relief and incentives, and a bronze plaque. To qualify for landmark status, property must be at least 50 years old and have some historical, cultural, architectural or engineering significance. The Historical Society of Oak Park and River Forest also offers a program that recognizes the historical or architectural significance of an individual house, apartment, condominium or commercial building. Property owners apply to the Historical Society and if they meet certain criteria, can purchase an oval-shaped cast bronze plaque that lists the original owner's name, year the property was built and the name of the architect or builder. ## Annual fall leaf collection begins in October

Oak Parkers who choose to rake their leaves rather than compost them can take advantage of the Village's annual fall leaf collection program scheduled for Oct. 18 through Dec. 2. Residents will have seven opportunities to have their leaves picked up. Leaves should be raked into the street at least 18 inches from the curb the day before the scheduled dates indicated on the map. Residents who miss a scheduled pickup date should keep leaves on the parkway until the night before the next scheduled pickup. Cooperation is essential to the success of the program, so please follow these simple rules:

- Leaves only — do not add brush, tree branches, grass clippings or yard waste.
- Do not park on or near a pile of leaves, which can hinder leaf removal. Heat from a car also could ignite the leaves.
- Rake leaves onto side streets whenever possible, avoiding major thoroughfares where piles of leaves might create traffic hazards.
- Do not rake leaves into or close to cul de sacs or traffic diverters. The equipment needs room to operate.
- Keep catch basins clear of raked leaves to avoid localized flooding.
- Inform landscape services of the leaf collection schedule.
- Dampen piles after raking to avoid wind-blown leaves.
- Consider alternatives to raking such as composting or using leaves as garden mulch.
- Drive carefully — leaves are slippery when wet and large piles may hinder visibility.
- Be sure to obey all parking restrictions — or risk a citation.

Checks should be accompanied by any support materials required to make sure the payment is properly applied, including writing the account number on the check memo line. Cash should never be used for drop-box or mail payments. **Drivers urged to take extra care**

**Office hours...**The Office of the Village Clerk is open 8:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. on Mondays and 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Tuesday through Friday.

**Vehicle stickers required...**All Oak Park residents who own or use a vehicle are required to purchase vehicle stickers annually by June 30. Fees for all classifications of vehicles double on July 1. Annual vehicle sticker fees vary by type of vehicle. Residents 65 years of age or older and residents who have disability plates or a permanent disability placard, pay a reduced fee. Truck fees depend on class. Owners of motorcycles, mopeds, recreational vehicles and buses also must purchase and display a vehicle sticker. Call 708.358.5670 for details.

**Volunteer for a board or commission...**Residents 18 or older, including homeowners and renters, are invited to volunteer to serve on one of the more than 25 citizen boards and commissions that advise the Village Board on a range of important issues. Most boards and commissions meet monthly in the evening. Terms typically are for three years. Some commissions also include a position for a high school student for a one-year term. **Stop solicitors...**To prevent door-to-door solicitors from knocking, obtain a No Soliciting sticker to place on or near your front door. All solicitors must be licensed through the Office of the Village Clerk and carry the license with them. If a solicitor knocks on your door, always ask to see the Village license. To file a complaint against a solicitor, call 708.358.5674 or, if after business hours, call the non-emergency Police number, 708.386.3800.

**Garage sales...**No permit is required, but the number of garage sales is limited to two per season per household. Items may be displayed only within a resident's garage and/or rear yard, and sales are limited to the daylight hours of three consecutive days. Signs may not be posted on the public way, public trees or any other public property.

**Testimony sought on bee hives**

**Seasonal flu vaccinations offered**  
 The Health Department will offer seasonal flu vaccinations by appointment at community clinics beginning in September. Seasonal influenza is recommended for all persons over the age of six months — including school-aged children — who want to reduce the risk of becoming ill with the flu or spreading the flu to others. Flu shots will be \$25 for adults and \$10 for children under 18 years of age. Medicare B recipients must present a Medicare card to demonstrate eligibility for a free flu shot. **West Nile Virus threat not over yet**  
 While mosquitoes are likely to become less active as summer heat diminishes, the threat of West Nile Virus could continue as late as mid-October. Public Health officials urge residents not to become complacent and to continue taking precautions to prevent being bitten by mosquitoes. Precautions include wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors between dusk and dawn, and wearing insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus.
