These efforts include developing clear, consistent communication processes, reimagining the Welcome Center at Village Hall as a more inclusive and welcoming space, and strengthening support for public-facing services and events through management of the Village's special events permitting process. Additionally, the division will work with the community to develop a Neighborhood Registry, which aims to foster residentto-resident connections, support neighborhood identity and make it easier for community groups to access Village resources. The division also serves as a liaison between the community and Village departments — helping residents, partners and community organizations navigate services and connect with the right resources. Fire Department testing hydrants



he Oak Park Fire Department is testing fire hydrants throughout the summer as part of a routine procedure to ensure proper operations of these vital emergency response devices. Crews will be out until the end of September inspecting, flushing and measuring flow rates on all 1,240 fire hydrants in the Village. The inspections also will make sure all hydrants are accessible and not damaged in any way. Residents on the same water line may notice cloudy water the first time a tap is opened after a nearby test. Officials say any cloudiness in the water should clear up if the tap is allowed to run for a few minutes. The test entails attaching a short hose with a diverter to the hydrant. The hose and diverter help

make sure the rush of water from the hydrant goes into the street and does not damage any nearby landscaping. A gauge attached to the hydrant provides water flow data that is recorded and compared to data from the same hydrant compiled over the previous five years. The comparison can help identify any changes in pressure that could indicate a problem with the water supply system that needs to be investigated, according to Fire Department officials. Avoid risks around downed power lines

When severe weather brings down power lines, public safety personnel urge residents to be aware of the danger. Their advice — always assume power lines are live, since even momentary contact with a live power line can injure or kill. If a power line comes down, ideally a firefighter or police officer will stand by the site until utility workers arrive. But when emergency conditions are widespread, personnel may not be available for this level of service. In those instances, affected streets or alleys are blocked and the area around the downed wire isolated by yellow warning tape. Vehicle license deadline nears

very Oak Park resident is required to purchase a license for each owned or leased motor vehicle before July 15. Vehicle licenses can be purchased and renewed online at www.oak-park.us/ParkingPortal. Vehicle license rates vary by type of vehicle. Persons age 65 and older, and anyone who has a state-issued handicapped license plate or placard, can apply for a discount. Disabled and active-duty veterans with proper documentation can apply for free vehicle licenses. The rate increases by \$20 after the deadline. Fight the bite this West Nile season

s temperatures rise, so does the threat of the mosquitoborne West Nile Virus. Last year, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 69 human cases, 19 of which were in Cook County, and 13 deaths.

Take precautions...Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes by wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active and using insect repellant that contains DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol. Residents also are urged to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites by cleaning roof gutters, storing containers upside down, emptying birdbaths every few days and any other precautions to avoid standing water on their property. Make sure to repair torn window screens, which should be tight-fitting and without gaps, to avoid mosquitos getting inside. Depending on the bird's condition and species, a Health Department staff member may pick up the carcass for testing.

Abatement efforts...The Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District treats all street catch basins with larvicide every seven to 10 days during the mosquito-breeding season. The abatement district also will treat catch basins on private property by request and pick up old vehicle tires. Call 708.447.1765 or visit www.desplainesvalleymad.com for more information.

Spraying notification...Residents who wish to be notified when the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District has scheduled spraying for adult mosquitoes can sign up at www.oak-park.us/notifyme. Registrants will be notified by an automated telephone system, email or text message.

Be cautious of electricity service scams

f someone calls or knocks on your door promising a better deal on electricity, be cautious — you could be misled into switching to a supplier that will cost more. Salespeople who offer to save you money may ask for your account number or to see your bill. Most likely they are selling a low introductory rate or trying to get your account number so they can switch you to a different provider without your permission. Representatives from the Village and its electricity supplier, MC Squared Energy, never solicit door-to-door or by telephone. Each year the Village bundles residential and small business electric accounts and seeks competitive bids from electricity suppliers. The state law that gave the Village this authority also allows companies to market their programs directly to consumers. While these companies may be approved by the state, high-pressure salespeople often are accused of misleading consumers about the costs and risks of signing up. ComEd, which owns the wires and poles, continues to distribute the power and is responsible for outages and billing, regardless of the power supplier. Bills from ComEd list the name of your electricity supplier. Enrollment for Oak Park's municipal electricity aggregation program typically opens in the fall, and eligible customers are enrolled automatically unless they have opted out previously through a very specific process. Residents who feel threatened by an aggressive solicitor are urged to call 911. Anyone with concerns about the status of an electricity account can call ComEd at 1.800.334.7661. Tips for avoiding scams:

- Never share your account number in person or over the telephone
- Never allow a solicitor to see your bill
- Never make a payment to a door-to-door solicitor or over the telephone
- Never share your credit card number, social security number or other personal information

Follow policy-making online, on demand

Residents interested in keeping up with local municipal policymaking can follow Village Board meetings at www.oak-park.us/boardtv, where meetings are streamed live and archived for on-demand viewing. The online meetings database offers the option to search the meetings archive using key words to find a particular topic of interest. Users also can select a video by meeting date and then choose to view only the portion of the meeting that addresses the topic of interest just by clicking on the agenda item. Village Board meetings are broadcast live on VOP-TV, which is available to Comcast subscribers on channel 6 and AT&T Uverse customers on channel 99. For those residents who want to dig even deeper into the details, complete board packets — the materials trustees use to prepare for meetings — are posted on the board TV web page as well, along with the approved minutes of past meetings, which are the official record of Village Board actions. Residents who leave their windows and patio doors open overnight to catch a summer evening breeze could unwittingly become targets of burglars. Oak Park Police urge residents to use devices that prevent entry by limiting travel of the sash or door. Making sure patio furniture cannot be used as a makeshift ladder to reach higher windows also is important. Now is the time for native parkway gardens

The Village is encouraging homeowners to plant native gardens in the parkways adjacent to their properties. Native gardening helps support pollinators and local wildlife while improving soil health and water retention and reducing the need for pesticides and fertilizers. Residents interested in planting native gardens should follow the Parkway Planting Ordinance. Parkway gardens must adhere to the following guidelines:

- Plants must be maintained in a way that does not pose a danger to the health, safety, or welfare of the general public.
- Parkway plants should not exceed 36 inches in height, or 30 inches within a clear sight area for the safety of users of the sidewalks and streets.
- Keep the sidewalk and road clear of any plant material.
- Maintain a clear area of 4 feet around fire hydrants to maintain visibility and access.
- Garden containers less than 30 gallons can be placed in the parkway between March 1 and Oct. 31.
