Pursuant to Village of Oak Park Resolution 20-120 dated March 13, 2020, the Oak Park Village Board has declared an emergency affecting the public health due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 disease pursuant to Section 8-10-5 of the Illinois Municipal Code, 65 ILCS 5/8-10-5, and Sections 2-6-10, 2-27-9 and 20-1-6(Z) of the Village Code. Pursuant to the Resolution, the Village's Public Health Director has the authority to make "reasonable rules, regulations and orders . . . as may from time to time be deemed necessary for the preservation and improvement of the public health and for the suppression of disease."

### **BULLETIN**

The spread of COVID-19 is a rapidly evolving situation and the intent of this BULLETIN is to share with the public basic public health information that does not require the issuance of an emergency notification through the Village's alert system that is used to notify residents when emergency situations occur, not general information. ### **BULLETIN ON STATUS OF COVID-19 TESTING**

There were no new reports today, Thursday March 19 of Oak Park residents testing positive for the COVID-19 virus. There is currently one positive test in Oak Park to-date, an individual screened and tested Monday March 16 at Rush Oak Park Hospital, and the positive result confirmed on Wednesday March 18.

The Oak Park Department of Public Health is working closely with officials from the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH), monitoring active tests and will continue to update this bulletin when/if any positive COVID-19 tests of Oak Park residents are reported. Local public health officials, hospitals and first responders are following protocols consistent with the latest guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

It is a crime to knowingly spread any false information or report that a person has contracted COVID-19 disease on any social media or other public platform under the Illinois Department of Public Health Act or to make a false report regarding the contraction or spread of COVID-19 to any public official under the Illinois Criminal Code.
