

Divvy bike sharing program arrives in Oak Park



Getting around Oak Park by bike is becoming easier than ever for residents and visitors alike thanks to the arrival of the Divvy bike share program.

The first of 13 Divvy stations was expected to begin operating in July, along with a dozen others in high-traffic locations throughout the Village, as Oak Park joined the bike share program with the largest geographic reach in North America.

Oak Park stations are being located strategically near the CTA Green Line and Metra tracks downtown and the CTA Blue Line and Interstate 290 in south Oak Park, as well as along Madison Street and near the Frank Lloyd Wright Home and Studio. Stations also are planned for by the Dole Branch of the Oak Public Library and West Suburban Medical Center in northeast Oak Park.

Each Divvy docking site has an automated pay station that allows cyclists to rent bikes 24 hours a day, seven days a week, year-round. Riders can purchase an annual membership or simply buy a 24-hour pass. Bikes can be picked up at one station and dropped off at another.

Divvy has been operating in Chicago neighborhoods since its launch in 2013, but began an aggressive expansion this year that includes Oak Park and Evanston, as well as dozens of new locations in neighborhoods on the city's west, south and far north sides.

When the expansion is complete in July, Divvy will have more than 580 stations and 5,800 bikes spread across more than 100 square miles of Chicagoland, making it the largest and most diverse bike share system in North America.

Divvy's expansion into Oak Park and Evanston was made possible by a grant from the Illinois Department of Transportation, with Chicago and the two suburban communities each providing a 20 percent local share for their stations and bikes.

Oak Park has a long tradition of encouraging safe cycling with bicycle friendly share the road signs at all major community entry points, marked dedicated and shared bicycle lanes on numerous streets and bike racks located throughout the community.

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Tobacco use limited to 21 and older

Come August 1, Oak Park will join a growing national movement aimed at deterring tobacco use among young people by increasing the minimum age to possess or purchase to 21 years old. Anyone under age 21 caught purchasing or possessing tobacco products will face a minimum \$25 fine for the first offense once the law goes into effect. The minimum penalty for anyone selling tobacco products to customers under 21 was increased to \$100. The new Village ordinance also makes it illegal for anyone under 21 years old to sell tobacco products, but implementation of that section of the law was delayed until Aug. 1, 2017 to give merchants sufficient time to make any necessary staffing changes. Much like with alcohol, businesses that sell tobacco products will be required to have someone 21 or older perform the sale or face a fine for each violation. To date, more than 120 cities in seven states have raised tobacco use to age 21. California and Hawaii also have increased their age requirements statewide. Two opportunities ahead to recycle electronics


Oak Park residents can recycle outdated and unwanted electronics from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturdays, July 30 and Aug. 27. Most items are accepted, including computers, peripherals, laptops, monitors, TVs, cell phones, rechargeable batteries, printers, fax machines, MP3 players, portable digital assistants, video game consoles, video cassette recorders/players, digital video disk players, zip drives, scanners and microwaves. However, console and projection televisions cannot be accepted. These events are sponsored in part by the Illinois EPA, the West Cook County Solid Waste Agency and Credential Wholesalers. Cooling centers offer relief from extreme heat

With the highest temperatures of the season typically coming in July and August, public health officials urge residents to protect themselves and their loved ones from the sometimes severe consequences of extreme heat. While everyone is susceptible to heat-related illnesses, the elderly and individuals with chronic diseases are at greater risk. On excessively hot days, avoid strenuous activity and stay inside whenever possible. And be sure to check on relatives, neighbors and friends. Residents who don't have access to air conditioning are encouraged to take advantage of Oak Park's free cooling centers at Rush Oak Park Hospital, 520 S. Maple Ave., and West Suburban Medical Center, 3 Erie Court. When triggered by extreme temperatures, the centers are open seven days a week — 5:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. at West Suburban and 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Rush. Hours may be extended when weather conditions warrant. To find out if a cooling center is open after hours, call West Suburban Hospital at 708.763.6747 or Rush Oak Park Hospital at 708.660.6000. If transportation is needed, call the Oak Park Police Department's non-emergency number 708.386.3800. Village Hall, 123 Madison St., also is a cooling center from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Residents 60 years old and older also can visit Oak Park Township Senior Services, 130 S. Oak Park Ave., from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., Monday through Friday — call 708.383.8060 if transportation is needed. For more information on dealing with the heat, email health@oak-park.us.


How Divvy Works

Divvy bikes are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, year-round. Each station has a touchscreen kiosk, station map and a docking system that releases bikes using a member key or ride code.

Here's how to use Divvy:

- **Join:** Purchase an annual membership online for \$9.95 per month (\$99 a year if paid in advance) or get a 24-hour pass from any Divvy station for \$9.95. Oak Park residents can call 708.358.7275 or email parking@oak-park.us for a coupon code for a discount on an annual membership. Annual members receive a unique Divvy key in the mail after completing the application. You must be 16 years or older to ride Divvy.
- **Take:** Annual members insert the key into the slot at any station with an available bike. Purchasers of a 24-hour pass receive a code to type into the keypad on any dock with an available bike.
- **Ride:** 30-minute, unlimited trips are offered for the duration of the membership or pass to run an errand, grab a bite to eat or commute to work or school. Trips that last longer than 30 minutes incur usage fees.
- **Return:** Lock the bike back at any station. Wait for the green light to confirm the bike is secure. Divvy crews constantly monitor and balance stations to make sure they are neither full nor empty.
- **Repeat:** Take as many trips as you want during the membership or pass period.

Disconnecting gutters from sewer can reduce flooding chances

Disconnecting gutter downspouts from the municipal sewer system can help reduce the chances of backups during heavy rain. While storm water from roof gutters is not a problem under normal conditions, the main system can become overwhelmed during heavy rain events, sometimes causing sewage and storm water to back up into basements. A one-inch rainfall on a 1,000-square-foot roof can produce 600 gallons of water. Disconnecting gutter downspouts from the municipal sewer system also can offer a way to capture free water for plants, lawns and gardens. Capturing storm runoff in rain barrels or rain gardens and using native plants in landscaping to help absorb runoff are effective methods. Gutter Disconnection Tips

- Extend downspouts at least three to six feet away from the building foundation wall and direct flow away from the building.
- Pick a suitable area for water to flow to such as a grassy area or rain garden. Route downspout extensions under decks or patios to reach these permeable areas.
- Avoid placing an extension across a sidewalk so as not to create a tripping hazard.
- Use a splash block at the end of the extension to avoid soil erosion.
- Avoid flowing water onto sidewalks or driveways since these may freeze during cold months.
- Remember to cap the sewer where the downspout once connected to prevent debris and animals from entering and odors from escaping.

Downed power lines pose real risks

When severe weather brings down power lines, public safety personnel urge residents to be aware of the danger. Their advice — always assume power lines are live, since even momentary contact with a live power line can injure or kill. If a power line comes down, ideally, a firefighter or police officer will stand by the site until utility workers arrive. But when emergency conditions are widespread, personnel may not be available for this level of service. In those instances, affected streets or alleys are blocked and the area around the downed wire isolated by yellow warning tape. Farmers' Market in full swing



The Oak Park Farmers' Market is open for business from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. every Saturday through October. Now in its 41st season, the venerable market is held in the Pilgrim Church parking lot just west of the intersection of Lake Street and Ridgeland Avenue. In addition to a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, dried and cut flowers, bedding plants, honey and cheeses from Illinois and neighboring states, the market also offers warm donuts made on-site, juice and coffee, and live bluegrass music. Regional vendors featuring sus-

tainable, organic and locally sourced goods are participating again this season as well, including several offering heirloom products. Non-profit bake sales are there, too, along with children's activities and occasional cooking demonstrations. In addition, Chicago Public Radio's WBEZ-FM will broadcast live from select markets. How to properly dispose of storm debris

When severe weather brings down branches and even entire trees, property owners are urged not to bring any debris from trees on private property to the parkway or street, which can lead to clogged sewer inlets and localized flooding during heavy rains. Public Works crews only pick up debris from parkway trees — a big job with nearly 19,000 trees on public property throughout the Village. However, brush from private property will be treated as yard waste if it is tied into bundles, each tagged with a green yard waste sticker and placed in the regular refuse pick-up area. Each bundle should be no larger than two feet in diameter, four feet in length and not exceed 50 pounds. Yard waste stickers are \$2.45 each and are available at most Village grocery and hardware stores, as well as in the cashier's office at Village Hall, 123 Madison St. The Village's contract refuse hauler also will come to a home and estimate the cost for removing larger, unbundled quantities of yard waste — call 888.656.5350 to request an estimate. Refuse collection is funded by user fees billed quarterly with the water bill, rather than property taxes, an approach that means only those properties that require the service pay. About half of Oak Park's 26,000 residential addresses are in multifamily buildings. West Nile Virus threat returns

As temperatures rise, so does the threat of the mosquito-borne West Nile Virus. Illinois reported 77 human cases and nine deaths last year. The severity of this season has not been established, but the virus has been found in several counties and one human case had been reported by mid-June.

Take precautions... Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes by wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active and wearing insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Residents also are urged to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites by cleaning roof gutters, storing containers upside down and emptying birdbaths every few days. Report dead birds... If you see a dead bird call the West Nile Virus Hotline 708.358.5694. Depending on the bird's condition and species, a Health Department staff member may pick up the carcass for testing.

Prevention efforts... The Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District treats all street catch basins with larvicide every seven to 10 days during the mosquito-breeding season. The abatement district also will treat catch basins on private property by request and pick up old vehicle tires. Call 708.447.1765 or visit www.desplainesvalleymad.com for more information.

Spraying notification... Residents who wish to be notified when the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District has scheduled spraying for adult mosquitoes can sign up at www.oak-park.us/notifyme. Registrants will be notified by an automated telephone system, email or text message as soon as possible following a decision to spray in Oak Park. 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Outdoor sculpture walk comes to Mills Park

The Oak Park Sculpture Walk is back for a fifth season, with 12 sculptures on display in an outdoor exhibit through Sept. 5 in Mills Park. Located near Pleasant and Home avenues just east of Marion Street, the park's four-plus acres provides a scenic backdrop for the sculptures, which are displayed along the winding walking paths. This year's sculptures come from near and far. Oak Park resident Tia Jones-Etu's *Flower*, a celebration of the growing season, is located near the park's north-east entrance. Pieces created by artists from Texas, Missouri and Iowa also are part of this year's exhibit. Sculptures are chosen through a juried competition and vary in materials. The Sculpture Walk is organized by the Public Art Advisory Commission, citizen volunteers who promote the acquisition and placement of public art that reflects diversity and artistic expression, and enhances the aesthetic environment of the Village. Composting program diverts organic waste from landfills

The Village offers a food scrap composting program to residents who wish to reduce the amount of organic refuse sent to landfills. Currently, 1,063 households participate in the Village program that provides a special 96-gallon mobile cart for organics, an under-sink collection bucket and a box of compostable bags for food scraps. The cost is \$14 per month, which is about the same as recycling one bag of yard waste per week under the current Village-wide yard program that does not accept food scraps and requires a \$2.45 green sticker be attached to each bag or barrel. Subscribers who use the organics cart for their yard waste as well as food scraps do not need yard waste stickers for grass clippings and other gardening waste since it can go right into the organics cart. Residents who maintain backyard compost piles or mulch grass clippings are urged to investigate sharing organics carts and costs with neighbors. Food scraps and food-soiled paper make up about 35 percent of what residents throw away, which is the largest unrecycled portion of the residential waste stream.
