

State moving closer to final plan for I-290's future

As the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) narrows the list of I-290 alternatives to four, an additional lane through Oak Park seems all but certain without a major shift in the planning process.

And while state officials say the added lane would not require taking any land in the Village, moving the Harlem Avenue and Austin Boulevard ramps to the outside lanes as proposed in all IDOT alternatives is sure to dramatically change traffic patterns along the busy corridor through Oak Park.

Local officials and dedicated I-290 process watchers have criticized the state approach that has made building a wider highway the centerpiece of plans to improve I-290 traffic flow, while alternatives like expanding the Blue Line railway westward have been dismissed in favor of buses linking to existing hubs.

Voicing their concern about the absence of alternatives to expanding the highway, Village officials say they are particularly troubled by deficiencies in the process to garner public input. When residents have submitted comments, IDOT has been slow to respond, officials say, and the state has not provided routine and timely updates via the website they promoted as the interactive portal for public collaboration.

Officials are even more disturbed by the interpretation of statistical data to demonstrate that widening the highway and moving the Harlem and Austin ramps is the only feasible approach to reducing highway congestion.

Environmental and public health considerations also are absent from the process used to study and evaluate options for achieving a long-term regional solution to the transportation challenges posed by the expressway, according to local residents who have most closely monitored the IDOT approach.

Officials insist on a 21st century solution and are unwilling to accept simply building bigger highways, rather than advocating broader transportation initiatives.

Promising to continue working with IDOT to address concerns about the turn I-290 plans have taken, Village officials also are urging residents to monitor the planning process at www.eisenhowerexpressway.com and to voice their views to state officials.

Solicitors...Soliciting is limited to 9 a.m. – 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday. Soliciting on Sundays and holidays is prohibited. All solicitors must register with the Village and carry a permit for identification. Solicitors and handbill distributors are instructed not to contact homes and businesses displaying a no solicitor sticker. To report a violation or request a sticker, call 708.358.5670, e-mail clerk@oak-park.us or come to Village Hall, 123 Madison St.

Taxi rules...All taxicabs licensed in Oak Park must clearly display a photo ID, chauffeur license and no-smoking notice. No taxi driver may use a cell phone while driving a customer. For more information or to register a complaint, call 708.358.5670 or e-mail clerk@oak-park.us.

Business licenses...All businesses operating in Oak Park must have a current business license on display. Home-based businesses, such as internet companies and professional offices, also must register with the Office of the Village Clerk in Village Hall, 123 Madison St. Prohibited types of home businesses include manufacturing, animal hospitals, barbershops, beauty salons, medical clinics, repair shops and restaurants. About that garage sale...

A maximum of two garage sales may be held by members of one residence and/or family during any calendar year. Garage sales are intended for disposing of personal property, not for merchandise purchased for resale or on consignment. A permit is not required. However, certain rules do apply:

- Sales are limited to the daylight hours of no more than three consecutive days.
- Items must be displayed within a garage, residence, carport and/or rear yard, unless it is a neighborhood sale.
- Advertising signs may be displayed only on the property where the sale is held, and only while the sale is in progress.
- Signs may not be larger than eight square feet or displayed on public property including light poles, sign posts or on or above the public parkways or sidewalks.

Remember, the individual conducting the sale and the owner or tenant of the premises where the sale is being held is responsible for maintaining order at the sale site and may be subject to penalty for any violations of garage sale rules. Block party information available via e-mail



Residents interested in receiving information about block parties are invited to join the Village Clerk's mailing list via clerk@oak-park.us. Be sure to include your name, telephone number and the block you represent. Each block may schedule two block parties per year, but since some weekends fill quickly, plan early to get preferred dates. Block party organizers are urged to remember the following rules:

- **Use a north-south block.** Due to public safety and traffic considerations, block parties are not allowed on east-west streets.
- **Ensure access by emergency vehicles.** Tables, chairs or other items should not project more than six feet from the curb. And don't stretch wires, ropes, nets, lights, banners or other items across the street.
- **Supervise children at all times.** Even though the street may be closed, accidents can happen.
- **Use only street barricades provided by the Village.** Cars parked in a street as a barricade may impede emergency vehicles, and could be ticketed.
- **Do not plan a party for an alley.** Alleys provide important access for utility companies and other services.
- **Keep sidewalks clear.** Sidewalks are public ways that may not be obstructed even during a block party.
- **Keep alcohol on private property.** Alcohol may not be sold.



Owners responsible for private property storm debris disposal

When severe weather creates debris from trees on private property, owners are reminded not to bring limbs or brush to the curb, but make other arrangements for its disposal. Public Works crews only pick up debris from parkway trees. However, brush from private property will be treated as yard waste if it is tied into bundles, each tagged with a green yard waste sticker and placed in the regular refuse pick-up area. Each bundle should be no larger than two feet in diameter, four feet in length and not exceed 50 pounds. Yard waste stickers are \$2.36 each and are available at most Village grocery and hardware stores, as well as in the cashier's office at Village Hall, 123 Madison St. The Village's contract refuse hauler also will come to a home and estimate the cost for removing larger, unbundled quantities of yard waste — call 888.656.5350. Parkway plantings can pose risks

Property owners who see the parkways as fertile ground for their green thumbs may actually be putting the trees at risk — not to mention themselves. Digging on parkways — the space between sidewalks and streets — can damage tree roots as well as utility lines that run from the streets into homes, including high-pressure natural gas lines. Most parkway planting rules, such as height restrictions to ensure driver and pedestrian sight lines, are linked to public safety and maintaining the health of the Village's urban forest. Raised planters and piling mulch up against the trunks of parkway trees — or volcano mulching — are prohibited because of their harmful effect on healthy tree growth. The same goes for hard surfaces, such as pavers, railroad ties, timbers, fencing or other structures that can damage tree roots, create habitat for harmful insects and restrict proper root growth. Using fertilizers and pesticides on parkway plantings is prohibited as well since pedestrians and pets abound in our walkable community. Parkway also are poor sites for anyone considering an urban vegetable garden. Given the winter road salt spray and frequent use of parkways by the Village's more than 3,000 registered dogs and cats, most experts would say a raised garden in a back yard is a better site choice — especially since it also can be fenced in to keep out the rabbits, opossums and other wild animals that share the community. Any resident who wishes to plant something other than grass on the parkway adjacent to his or her property should contact the Village for guidance prior to purchasing plants or beginning to dig. Police offer tips to deter bicycle thieves

Bicycle thefts tend to increase during warmer weather. Following these steps, police say, can help deter bicycle thieves:

- Never let anyone you do not know take your bike for a ride.
- Beware of two people on one bike. Bicycle thieves often travel in pairs this way.
- Trust your instincts. If you feel someone is going to take your bicycle, shout for help.
- Stay in the company of friends — there usually is safety in numbers.
- Think twice about resisting — your bike can be replaced.
- Call the police immediately if you see anyone suspicious hanging around a bike rack, in a neighbor's yard or near a garage.
- Register your bike with the Village. Should your bike be stolen and later recovered the registration provides information about its rightful owner.
- Never leave your bike unlocked or unattended.
- Lock your bike even when it is stored in a closed garage, enclosed porch or basement common area.

Bicycles and sidewalks

Specific rules apply when it comes to riding a bicycle on a Village sidewalk. Riding on a sidewalk by anyone of any age is prohibited in the business districts. And only those under 15 years of age may ride on a sidewalk anywhere else in the community. Youngsters riding on sidewalks always must yield to pedestrians. West Nile Virus threat returns

As temperatures increase so does the threat of the mosquito-borne West Nile Virus. Illinois reported 290 human cases and 12 deaths last year, the highest since the first outbreak in 2002 and the fourth highest in the nation, according to public health officials. Illinoisans contracting the virus ranged from nine to 89 years old, with more than three-quarters of the cases among those 45 years old and older.

Take precautions...Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes by wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors between dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active and wearing insect repellent containing DEET, Picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Residents also are urged to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites by cleaning roof gutters, storing containers upside down and emptying birdbaths every few days. Report dead birds...If you see a dead bird call the West Nile Virus Hotline 708.358.5694. Depending on the bird's condition and species, a Health Department staff member will pick up the carcass for testing.

Prevention efforts...The Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District will treat all street catch basins with larvicide every seven to 10 days during the mosquito-breeding season. The abatement district also will treat catch basins on private property by request and pick up old vehicle tires. Call 708.447.1765 or visit www.desplainesvalleymad.com for more information.

Spraying notification...Residents who wish to be notified when the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District has scheduled spraying for adult mosquitoes can sign up at www.oak-park.us. Registrants will be notified by an automated telephone system, e-mail or text message as soon as possible following a decision to spray in Oak Park. Individuals without computer access may call 708.358.5694 to leave their phone number for telephone notification only. Visit www.desplainesvalleymad.com for information on spraying.

Register to vote at Village Hall

The Village Clerk, as the local election authority, registers voters at Village Hall, 123 Madison St. Residents can register to vote in local, state and federal elections during regular business hours, 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Voter registration requires two types of identification, at least one with the current address. A driver's license or picture ID is preferred, along with an additional item such as a lease or utility bill. If a currently registered resident moves even within Oak Park, the registration information must be transferred to the new address. Under state law, a voter must be registered to vote at least one month prior to the date of the election to be eligible to participate. Farmers' Market in full swing

The Oak Park Farmers' Market is open for business from 7 a.m. – 1 p.m. every Saturday through October. Now in its 38th season, the venerable market is held in the Pilgrim Church parking lot just west of the intersection of Lake Street and Ridgeland Avenue. In addition to a variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, dried and cut flowers, bedding plants, honey and cheeses from Illinois and neighboring states, the market also offers warm donuts made on-site, juice and coffee, and live bluegrass music. Regional vendors featuring sustainable, organic and locally sourced goods are participating again this season as well, including several offering heirloom products. Non-profit bake sales are there, too, along with chefs from local restaurants cooking up demonstration dishes using fresh items purchased at the market. To help support market administration, several items are sold at the information tent, including reusable shopping bags. A majority of the vendors now accept credit/debit cards as well as Link cards.

Vehicle stickers on sale

Vehicle sticker sales are now underway. Every Oak Park resident who owns or leases a vehicle is required to purchase and display a vehicle sticker annually by July 15. Anyone who misses the deadline must purchase a sticker and pay a \$20 late fee. Failure to display a valid Village sticker by the deadline also may result in a \$50 ticket.

Residents whose vehicles already are registered with the Village can save 10 percent by renewing online at www.oak-park.us, rather than via mail or in person at Village Hall. Renewal forms mailed to current sticker holders include a unique web identification number that allows a vehicle owner to correct or update most data online, including address and telephone number, and add vehicle information. Anyone who loses the renewal notice can look up their web ID number using the e-mail address or telephone number included in the previous year's application.

Online payments require an e-mail address and a credit or debit card. The sticker is delivered via U.S. Mail, typically within a few days of purchase.

Residents who would like to renew online, but don't have access to a computer can come to Village Hall where a computer is available to the public for official business. Computers also are available at public library branches.

The online option is for renewals only. First-time vehicle sticker purchasers must come to Village Hall, 123 Madison St. A lease, utility bill or other government-issued proof of residency is required. A current vehicle sticker is needed to purchase a parking permit.

In-person sticker purchases and renewals are offered in the Parking Service Center at Village Hall from 8:30 a.m. – 7 p.m. Mondays, and 8:30 a.m. – 5 p.m., Tuesday – Friday. The Center also will be open for vehicle sticker purchases and renewals from 8:30 – 11:30 a.m., Sat., July 6. Village Hall will be closed on Thurs., July 4. Individuals renewing in person are urged to bring their renewal notice to speed up processing.

The online renewal system will continue to be available through July 15, but will automatically assess the late fee after the midnight deadline. Vehicle sticker rates vary by type of vehicle.
