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Village launches community biodiversity survey

Oak Park residents are encouraged to complete a community biodiversity survey to help the Village's Office of Sustainability & Resilience gather information on where there are existing projects in Oak Park that support biodiversity.

Examples of such projects include monarch gardens, rain gardens and lighting that is darksky approved. The survey also seeks to capture information about properties with green infrastructure such as permeable pavement, bioswales and rain barrels.

Information obtained from the survey will help the Village set goals and develop programs for increasing the amount of biodiversity and green infrastructure in the community.

The survey is available online at **www.oak-park.us/biodiversity** and is for anyone with an outdoor space on their property, including at homes and other buildings.

The project stems from the Climate Ready Oak Park plan, which calls for the community to protect biodiversity — defined as the variety of life in a particular habitat — as a way of ensuring a well-functioning ecosystem.

Pledge to maintain a pesticide-free lawn and garden

Gardening and lawn care chemicals can be harmful to humans, pets, wildlife and waterways. The good news is there are many surprisingly easy ways to care for your lawn and garden that avoid putting your family and wildlife at risk. The Village's Office of Sustainability & Resilience is inviting Oak Park residents to pledge to eliminate synthetic chemical use on their lawn and garden. Working to save the monarch butterfly

The Village of Oak Park is doing its part to help save the monarch butterfly, an iconic North American species whose populations have declined dramatically in recent years. Village officials have joined hundreds of communities across the country in signing the Mayors' Monarch Pledge to create a healthy habitat that will aid monarch butterflies on their annual migration across the continent. In addition to raising awareness of the decline of the monarch butterfly and the species' need for habitat, the Village plants native milkweed and nectar plants on public properties when appropriate across the community, including traffic diverters, cul-de-sacs, medians and planters. The Village's Public Works Center is also home to a certified Monarch butterfly waystation. Farmers' Market news

Corn roast... The Oak Park Farmers' Market's annual corn roast is set for Aug. 12. Guests can enjoy fresh-picked corn sold by the ear hot off the roaster from about 9 a.m. to noon. Be sure to bring cash for this fundraising event, as credit cards are not accepted when purchasing roasted corn.

Hot sandwiches...For the first time in its history, the Farmers' Market is selling hot sandwiches for customers to enjoy while they shop. Baked Cheese Haus has been handcrafting small-batch artisanal cheese in southwest Wisconsin since the 1890s. This long-term Market vendor is selling Raclette, which is scraped off the wheel in the traditional Swiss format, on fresh bread to create hot cheese sandwiches available for purchase each Market day.

SNAP/LINK among payment options... Making fresh produce affordable for all patrons is a priority at the Oak Park Farmers' Market, which has been providing SNAP/LINK card processing since 2011. The Market also offers matching value coupons throughout the season. For each dollar SNAP/LINK participants spend, they receive a \$1 coupon up to a maximum of \$25 in coupons per cardholder per Market day. Many vendors also accept WIC and Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program coupons.

Transportation available...Curb-to-curb transportation to and from the Oak Park Farmers' Market is available every Saturday. Look for the Oak Park Township bus at the Market entrance during Market hours. The wheelchair-accessible bus will transport shoppers to locations within Oak Park and River Forest. Reservations for rides to the Market can be made by calling 708.383.4806 between 8:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. A \$1 donation is suggested.

Guidance for storm debris pickup varies

ummer is an active period for Storms in the Midwest, and severe storms often result in fallen tree branches. If a branch falls from a parkway tree located between the curb and sidewalk, please contact Public Works at 708.358.5700 or publicworks@oak-park.us so the Village is aware of the issue and can pick up the debris. Officials ask residents to not cut up branches from parkway trees as it is faster for crews to feed one large branch into the wood chipper than a lot of smaller pieces. The Village does not pick up brush from trees on private property. If you have a small amount of private brush to dispose of, you can bundle it, attach a green yard waste sticker and set it out for in the regular collection area for regular garbage and recycling pickup. Bundles should be no larger than two feet in diameter or four feet in length and not weigh more than 50 pounds. If you have a larger amount of private brush, contact a tree care or landscape maintenance contractor for assistance. Open windows may invite burglars

esidents who leave their Nindows and patio doors open overnight to catch a summer evening breeze could unwittingly become targets of burglars. Oak Park Police urge residents to use devices that prevent entry by limiting travel of the sash or door. Making sure patio furniture cannot be used as a makeshift ladder to reach higher windows also is important. Back-to-school immunization...

Local health officials are reminding parents and caregivers that all children attending Illinois schools, both public and private, need to show proof of required immunizations in order to attend class each fall. Parents and caregivers may contact the Oak Park Public Health Department at 708.358.5480 or **health@oak-park.us** with questions about which immunizations are required or how to access them.

Homebound services available...

If you or a loved one are unable to access COVID or flu vaccines because you are homebound, the Oak Public Health Department will come to your residence to provide these immunizations. Please contact the Village's public health nurse at 708.358.5480 or **health@ oak-park.us** to schedule an appointment.

Bee allergy registry... The Village allows residents to keep bees on their property, but will not issue a permit for an apiary on a property within 150 feet of a residence of a person with an anaphylactic reaction to bee stings. If you have been diagnosed with such an allergy by a licensed physician, please provide documentation to the Public Health Department at **health@ oak-park.us**. Fight the bite this West Nile season

As temperatures rise, so does the threat of the mosquito-borne West Nile Virus. Last year, the Illinois Department of Public Health reported 32 human cases, 18 of which were in Cook County, and four deaths.

Take precautions... Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes by wearing long sleeves and pants, limiting time spent outdoors at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active and using insect repellant that contains



DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol. Residents also are urged to eliminate potential mosquito breeding sites by cleaning roof gutters, storing containers upside down, emptying birdbaths every few days and any other precautions to avoid standing water on their property. Report dead birds...If you see a dead bird call the West Nile Virus Hotline at 708.358.5694 or email **health@oak-park.us**. Depending on the bird's condition and species, a Health Department staff member may pick up the carcass for testing.

Prevention efforts... The Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District treats all street catch basins with larvicide every seven to 10 days during the mosquito-breeding season. The abatement district also will treat catch basins on private property by request and pick up old vehicle tires. Call 708.447.1765 or visit **www.desplainesvalleymad.com** for more information.

Spraying notification...Residents who wish to be notified when the Des Plaines Valley Mosquito Abatement District has scheduled spraying for adult mosquitoes can sign up at **www.oak-park.us/notifyme**. Registrants will be notified by an automated telephone system, email or text message as soon as possible following a decision to spray in Oak Park. Individuals without computer access may call 708.358.5694 to leave their phone number for telephone notification only. Spraying is only conducted in response to elevated levels of West Nile Virus in an area. Visit **www.desplainesvalleymad.com** for information about spraying.

Foam recycling event planned

A s part of its ongoing effort to expand recycling opportunities for Oak Park residents, the Public Works Department is making plans to include foam recycling at the Village's next paper shredding event in the fall. Foam products with the No. 6 symbol are not accepted as part of the Village's single-stream recycling program with waste hauler LRS. To fill the gap, the Village has scheduled Dart Container Corporation to collect foam products during the paper shredding event planned for 9 a.m. to noon on Sept. 23 at the Public Works Center, 201 South Blvd. In the meantime, residents can hang on to foam products with the No. 6 symbol rather than send them to the landfill. On the date of the recycling event, the foam products will need to be dropped off in a clear or translucent bag. Straws, lids and foam packaging peanuts will not be accepted, and any foodservice containers will need to be rinsed or wiped. Single-use plastic foodware available only by request

Anew local ordinance went into Aeffect in June requiring food establishments in Oak Park to only provide single-use plastic foodware upon request from a customer or at a self-service station in connection with any delivery or take-out order of food or beverage. The change is based on recent action taken by the Village Board to regulate the use of single-use plastics in an effort to reduce waste. Additional regulations related to the use of polystyrene foam packaging will also go into effect in 2024. Vehicle license deadline nears

Every Oak Park resident is required to purchase a license for each owned or leased motor vehicle before July 15. Purchase and renew vehicle licenses online at **www.oak-park.us/vehiclelicense**. Vehicle license rates vary by type of vehicle. Persons age 65 and older, and anyone who has a state-issued handicapped license plate or placard, can apply for a discount. Disabled and active-duty veterans with proper documentation can apply for free vehicle licenses. The rate increases by \$20 after the deadline. Leashes required...Dog owners are reminded that all dogs that use any street, sidewalk, parkway or public area within Oak Park must be on a leash no longer than 8 feet controlled by the owner. The Park District of Oak Park offers two areas where dogs can run off leash in Maple Park and Ridgeland Common. Both dog parks are free to Oak Park residents who have obtained a dog park pass. Picking up...It is the responsibility of all pet owners to pick up after their pets in order to avoid fines and keep public spaces clean. Pet owners are also urged to put their pet's waste in their own refuse container rather than a neighbor's.



Tips for planning a great block party

he Village encourages block parties as a way to build community spirit, meet neighbors and have fun. Each block may sponsor two block parties per year, but since some weekends fill quickly, plan early to get preferred dates. A petition signed by at least 10 separate addresses on the block is required to schedule a block party. Approved petitions allow the neighborhood to close off a street to vehicle traffic for the entire day. Block party organizers are urged to remember the following rules:

- Include everyone on the block especially renters in multifamily buildings.
- Use a north-south block. Due to public safety and traffic considerations, block parties are not allowed on east-west streets.
- Make sure emergency vehicles can get through if needed. Tables, chairs or other items should not project more than six feet from the curb. And don't stretch wires, ropes, nets, lights, banners or other items across the street.
- Supervise children at all times. Even though the street may be closed, accidents can happen.
- Use only street barricades provided by the Village. Cars parked in a street as a barricade may impede emergency vehicles, and could be ticketed.
- Keep sidewalks clear. Sidewalks are public ways that may not be obstructed even during a block party.
- Use only chalk for street and sidewalk art. Latex paint or other more permanent materials applied to public property including streets require prior approval - email village@oak-park.us for more information on the process.
- If alcohol is present, keep it on private property. Alcohol may not be sold.
