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Naloxone project launching in Oak Park

The Oak Park Department of Public Health is launching a new initiative aimed at preventing deaths caused by opioid overdoses.

Emergency opioid overdose boxes will be installed in seven easily accessible, public-facing locations throughout Oak Park. Each box contains several pouches with doses of naloxone and instructions on how to administer the potentially life-saving medication, which is designed to reverse the effects of an opioid overdose.

The boxes will be accessible 24 hours a day, and anyone who wishes to take one or more of the free pouches may do so anonymously. Locations of the boxes are being determined based on local overdose data, and will be posted on the project webpage at www.oak-park.us/naloxone.

What is naloxone?

Naloxone, also commonly referred to as the trademarked name Narcan, is a safe medication that works to reverse the effects of an overdose from opioids such as heroin, prescription painkillers and fentanyl.

Individuals concerned that someone is experiencing a drug overdose should immediately call 911, administer naloxone following the easy-to-use instructions included with the kit and stay on scene until emergency responders arrive.



Naloxone has no adverse effects, even on children. Naloxone is an opioid blocker, so it will not have an effect, positive or negative, on anything other than an opioid overdose.

Addressing opioid overdoses

Oak Park is no different than many communities across the country that have seen an increase in opioid overdoses in recent years. In 2022, 151 people experienced overdoses in Oak Park throughout the course of the year.

Across the United States, more than 500,000 people have died since the 1990s from opioid overdose involving both illegal and prescription drugs.

Project expenses are funded by the Illinois Opioid Allocation

Agreement, through which settlement funds from opioid manufacturers and distributors are distributed to states for use in combatting the opioid epidemic.

Police Department deploys body cameras

ield officers in the Oak Park Police Department are now equipped with officer-worn body cameras. The Village Board approved the purchase of the cameras last year as part of a comprehensive technology platform that includes new in-car video systems and tasers. The platform allows digital evidence to be reviewed by officers, with footage and live streams viewable in one central location, making it easier to proactively respond to threats, manage evidence and get a more comprehensive picture of an incident. Due to a nationwide chip shortage, delivery of the in-car systems has been delayed until later this year. The body-worn cameras automatically activate when an officer's weapon is unholstered. Otherwise, officers must activate the cameras. Once the new in-car video systems are implemented, the recordings will become even more automated as body-worn cameras will also be activated automatically when a police vehicle reaches a certain speed or its lights are turned on. The rollout of the body-worn cameras fulfills a state law that requires law enforcement agencies to implement their use. Vehicle license sales underway

very Oak Park resident who owns or leases a motor vehicle is required to purchase a local license before July 15. The rate increases by \$20 after the deadline. Vehicle licenses must be renewed annually. Renewal applications are mailed in May to residents who previously registered vehicles in Oak Park. Failure to purchase a license also could result in a ticket. A current vehicle license is needed to purchase a parking permit. Windshield decals are no longer issued. Parking enforcement officers use remote electronic recognition technology to scan license plates to ensure compliance. Vehicle license rates vary by type of vehicle, with discounts for senior citizens, persons with disabilities and active-duty veterans. Benchmarking ordinance aims to reduce energy use in buildings

The Village Board recently adopted an energy and water benchmarking ordinance to assist owners and managers of large commercial buildings in better understanding and improving their building's performance. Benchmarking entails measuring a building's energy and water use and comparing it to the use of similar buildings, its own historical output or a reference performance level. The energy used by commercial buildings in Oak Park is estimated to create one-third of the community's greenhouse gas emissions, which trap heat in the Earth's atmosphere and lead to climate change. The United States Environmental Protection Agency reports that buildings that practice benchmarking achieve an average annual energy savings of 2.4%. The Village is working closely with the Midwest Energy Efficiency Alliance (MEEA) to collect data and offer workshops for building owners and managers to receive hands-on training and support for data collection. The ordinance and the practice of reducing building energy use is a critical step that the Village can take to address climate change and reach the community's Climate Ready Oak Park goals. Construction project updates online

busy construction season is in full swing across Oak Park. Keep track of the latest information regarding road construction projects in in the Village at www.oak-park.us/construction. Simply click the project updates tab at the top of the page for regular updates on specific projects. The site also includes an interactive map that residents can use to track major construction projects. High-profile projects currently underway include street resurfacing along Roosevelt Road overseen by the Illinois Department of Transportation and construction along Division Street to replace water and sewer mains and resurface the roadway. Both the Roosevelt and Division projects will touch every section of the east-west roadways in Oak Park between Harlem Avenue and Austin Boulevard. Other projects on the horizon this spring include water and sewer replacements on Euclid Avenue from South Boulevard to Lake Street near the main fire station and on Augusta Street between Austin and Lombard Avenue. Sewer work will also be part of a streetscape project this summer on Madison Street between Oak Park and East avenues, and a streetscaping project is coming to Forest Avenue near Ontario Street in the coming months. Motorists should anticipate delays due to temporary lane shifts or road closures and are reminded to drive safely in construction zones.

Gas-powered leaf blowers on the way out

Earlier this spring the Village Board took action that will impact lawn maintenance and landscaping practices in Oak Park moving forward. Effective June 1, 2025, no gasoline-powered leaf blower may be operated in Oak Park at any time. Currently, gas-powered leaf blowers may be operated only between October 31 and May 31. Electric leaf blowers may be used year-round. Per Village ordinance, the operation of all leaf blowing equipment is allowed between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday-Friday and between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. These hours differ and are more restrictive than those listed in the Village Code's noise ordinance, which applies between the hours of 11 p.m. and 7 a.m. The use of any leaf blower in excess of more than 65 decibels, as rated by manufacturer's specifications, is also prohibited at any time under the current Village Code. The prohibition of gas-powered leaf blowers is one step the Village is taking to achieve the goals to decrease greenhouse gas emissions set forth in the Climate Ready Oak Park plan.

Impacts for landscaping businesses... Any contractor owning or operating any lawn maintenance or landscaping business that does work in the Village must now obtain a license to do so. Information about obtaining a lawn maintenance license will be available and shared with local landscaping companies. Light fixture upgrades coming to alleys

ore than 1,000 lights mounted on power poles in alleys throughout the Village are in line for an upgrade this summer. Crews will be replacing the old mercury vapor lights with new LED bulbs that will reduce energy consumption, provide better lighting levels and reduce maintenance costs. The new light fixtures are also designed to direct light to the ground rather than into the sky, making them dark sky compliant since they do not contribute to light pollution. Pick Oak Park supports local business community



Examples of hazardous household waste that can be safely disposed of include oil-based paints, aerosols, household cleaners, lawn chemicals and automotive chemicals. Electronic waste such as portable electronics, computer items and TV items will also be collected.

Oak Park Farmers' Market to begin 48th season

he Oak Park Farmers' Market returns for its 48th season on Sat., May 20. The Market is held from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. every Saturday from opening day through October in the Pilgrim Congregational Church parking lot, 460 Lake St., one block west of Ridgeland Avenue. More than two dozen independent farmers and producers participate in the Farmers' Market, offering everything from fresh fruits and vegetables to meat, cheese, eggs, flowers, bread, grains and honey. The Market also features donuts made on-site, fresh coffee and live bluegrass music. Non-profit bake sales are offered most Saturdays. A majority of vendors accept credit/debit cards, as well as WIC and senior coupons. All vendors accept LINK cards. Special events are held throughout the season, starting with Go Green Days on opening day and May 27 highlighting sustainability efforts in Oak Park. Support for Market administration comes from sales of a variety of items available at the information tent, including reusable shopping bags and t-shirts.
