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A Day in Our Village celebrating 50 years on June 2







An Oak Park celebration five decades in the making is coming Sun., June 2.

The 50th A Day in Our Village festival is set for 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. in Scoville Park at Lake Street and Oak Park Avenue.

The premier community event serves as an annual celebration of Oak Park's diversity and community involvement, and organizers are busy planning a memorable day worthy of this year's half-century milestone.

Live music, food and extensive activities for kids — including the return of fun with foam — are a few of the highlights in store.

At its core, A Day in Our Village has always provided an opportunity to showcase the variety of ways to get involved in community life. In keeping with that tradition, more than 100 activity booths representing Oak Park civic, cultural, social



service, educational and religious organizations will fill the park.

A wide array of live music acts ranging from jazz and big band to rock and R&B will perform on the Scoville Park stage. A food court featuring local restaurants will be located near the entrance to the Oak Park Public Library.

Young Oak Parkers will want to check out the activities for kids on the north side of the park along

Ontario Street between Oak Park Avenue and Grove Avenue — which will be closed to vehicle traffic during the event. Families will find other activities for kids throughout the park, including the return of a bubble foam machine managed by the Park District of Oak Park in a nod to A Day in Our Village tradition from previous decades.

Neighbor-to-neighbor climate coaching available

Oak Parkers interested in making their homes and properties more climate friendly are invited to access resources and technical support provided by fellow community members. Oak Park's neighborhood climate

coaching initiative is a partnership between the Village and the volunteer group Oak Park Climate Action Network (OPCAN) that offers a peer-expert advisory service to help residents navigate various pathways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, including home insulation and energy retrofits, heat pumps, rooftop and community solar, geothermal systems and electric vehicle (EV) adoption.



A wide range of resources are available at www.opcan.org, including a roadmap to electrification and in-depth information on cost estimates. The website also includes links to relevant financial incentives, all intended to serve renters, landlords and homeowners at all income levels. Additionally, the OPCAN website serves as a portal to connect community members to individualized neighbor-to-neighbor climate coaching provided by residents with expertise and experience in a range of climate solutions, from home energy assessments to native gardening to EV charging. Village officials say the majority of Oak Park's greenhouse gas emissions come from the energy used to heat and cool homes and buildings in the community. Reducing those emissions not only benefits the environment, it also makes homes and workplaces healthier and more comfortable, while lowering energy costs. Although OPCAN is an organization that operates separately from the Village, and the Village does not endorse any specific contractors listed on OPCAN's website, Village officials nonetheless support community members working together to share resources that can help reduce Oak Park's collective carbon footprint. Vision Zero team working on traffic safety recommendations

The Vision Zero project is midway through the planning process, and the project team is hard at work drafting recommendations for how to improve traffic safety in Oak Park. Findings from crash data, policy review,

Village hosting martial arts camp

Compost program diverts waste from landfills

The Village offers a food scrap composting collection program for residential households of up to five units. Participants receive a gray 96-gallon cart for weekly collection of organics, a three-gallon food scrap kitchen pail and a sample of compostable bags for food scraps. Both yard waste and food scraps may be placed in the organics cart, eliminating the need to purchase yard waste stickers. An organic cart subscription costs \$16.31 per month, which is about the cost of one yard-waste sticker and one yard-waste bag per week. Residents can share an organic cart with one other neighbor to reduce the monthly cost. More details and an online registration form are available at www.oak-park.us/compostable. Composting for apartment dwellers...In an effort to encourage composting among all residents, the Village has kitchen compost pails available for purchase for \$10 per pail at the cashier's window at Village Hall, 123 Madison St. The pails help simplify collection of food scraps for disposal at one of five free compost drop-off locations in the community. Each pail includes a screen-printed list of acceptable and unacceptable items and a vented lid that provides maximum odor control and air circulation. While the CompostAble collection program is only available to residential households of up to five units served by the Village's waste-hauling contract, residents who live in multifamily buildings or are otherwise not enrolled in the program may leave food scraps in the clearly labeled carts at one of five locations in the Village. Construction updates

Lot 10 upgrades underway... Changes are coming to Lot 10, the frequently-used parking lot situated along North Boulevard between Marion Street and Forest Avenue in the Downtown Oak Park business district. Construction began this spring with sidewalk replacement along the business frontage north of the parking lot that will be followed by a 4-6 week closure of the lot as crews install water permeable brick pavers at the site as part of green infrastructure upgrades. When work is complete, the lot will feature a new traffic pattern with cars entering from Forest and traveling west toward Marion. New angled parking will allow more sidewalk space along the business frontage to better accommodate outdoor dining, sidewalk sales and other special events that occur in Lot 10 throughout the year. The project will also include the resurfacing of North Boulevard between Marion and Forest. Officials anticipate Lot 10 will reopen this summer prior to special events scheduled for August and September.

Oak Park Avenue project coming in 2025...The Village continues to move forward with planning and design for the streetscape and utility infrastructure project on Oak Park Avenue in the Hemingway Business District. Construction is expected to begin in spring 2025 and be substantially completed in November 2025. The project will bring much-needed water, sewer and infrastructure improvements and a new streetscape on Oak Park Avenue generally between Pleasant Street and Ontario Street. The project will include new sidewalks, roadways, lighting and furniture and will create new public gathering spaces. The design team is progressing on the infrastructure and streetscape design after engaging with the Hemingway Business District, Chicago Transit Authority and Union Pacific on proposed improvements. The Village has also begun working with artists from across the nation to explore art installations for the project. The Village will host its second open house related to the project in June and will also be at A Day in Our Village on Sun., June 2 in Scoville Park to share the latest project design and field questions from the community. Cicadas are coming!

periodic cicadas will return to Oak Park this spring. The notoriously noisy insects have been living underground for the past 17 years. Their emergence is a highly coordinated, natural phenomena in our region during which large numbers of cicadas appear around the same time in May and early June. While cicadas do little damage, the noise produced by large numbers

of cicadas can be quite noticeable. While adult cicadas don't feed on trees, they do repeatedly drill into small stems to lay their eggs. Occasionally, this can cause smaller branches to die. This rarely impacts a tree's health unless it is small in size with few branches and a trunk less than 2 inches in diameter. If you have a small tree that you are concerned about, consider covering it with fine netting prior to the cicadas emerging.

Planting small trees can also be delayed until after the cicada emergence is over. Almost all of the trees that are part of the Village's spring tree planting program will be large enough in size to withstand the emergence of the cicadas. Vehicle license sales underway

very Oak Park resident who owns or leases a motor vehicle is required to purchase a local vehicle license before July 15. The rate increases by \$20 after the deadline. Vehicle licenses must be renewed annually. Renewal applications are mailed in May to residents who previously registered vehicles in Oak Park. Failure to purchase a license also could result in a ticket. A current vehicle license is needed to purchase a parking permit. Windshield decals are no longer issued as parking enforcement officers now use remote electronic recognition technology to scan license plates to ensure compliance. Vehicle license rates vary by type of vehicle, with discounts for senior citizens, persons with disabilities and active-duty veterans. Pet license registration available online

A telephone call from Animal Control is all it takes to reunite lost or strayed pets with their owners — provided those pets have been licensed and are wearing tags. All dogs and outdoor cats in Oak Park are required to be licensed annually. Owners must show proof of a current rabies inoculation before a license will be issued. The annual license fee of \$25 is reduced to \$10 for a spayed or neutered animal. Residents can register online at www.oak-park. us/villageview. The Village has implemented a new animal licensing system, so pet owners who are renewing their license will be required to register each pet for this first year of implementation. Village implements Urban Forest Management Plan

Earlier this year the Village Board approved Oak Park's first Urban Forest Management Plan. The plan is intended to serve as a living document that will guide the Village Forestry Division's actions for the next 20 years. Goals include increasing the community's tree canopy cover, maximizing the benefits parkway trees provide, mitigating the effects of climate change and ensuring tree equity throughout Oak Park. The creation of the Urban Forest Management Plan also satisfies a goal spelled out in the Climate Ready Oak Park plan adopted in 2022. Tree City USA recognition...The Arbor Day Foundation named Oak Park a 2023 Tree City USA recipient for its commitment to managing its urban forest. This is the 40th year the Village has been recognized for this achievement. Additionally, the Village received a Growth Award for the 17th time for continuing to grow its forestry program. Steps taken by the Village in the past year include updating Oak Park's parkway tree inventory, planting more trees than were removed and maintaining the community's younger trees. Water quality report available online...Oak Park residents interested in knowing about the quality of the water they drink can find the latest annual report at www.oak-park.us/waterqualityreport. Fire Department offers CPR training... The Oak Park Fire Department offers a variety of life-saving classes, including Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and training in how to use an automated external defibrillator, or AED. Classes are held in the Fire Department's American Heart Association-certified community training center at the main fire station, 100 N. Euclid Ave. All courses are taught by an AHA-certified instructor. Fees vary by type of class and residency. In-person registration is required, and class sizes are limited. Free mediation services available... The Village offers free mediation services to help landlords and tenants, as well other residents, resolve issues that may be disrupting quality of life. Cases can include disputes about a lease violation, a dispute with a noisy neighbor or even a dispute over property lines. Participation is voluntary. Public Health News

Opioid overdose prevention... The Oak Park Public Health Department is celebrating one year of its Opioid Overdose Prevention project, an initiative that aims to make the life-saving medication Naloxone (commonly known as Narcan) freely available to the community. One way to access free Narcan in Oak Park is via the project's seven boxes around the Village, most of which are accessible 24 hours a day. Over the course of the past year, community members have taken more than 700 opioid overdose prevention pouches from the boxes, totaling more than 1,400 doses of Narcan. Public Health Department staff have also hosted trainings for community groups and organizations that focus on how to administer Narcan and the principles of harm reduction. Including trainings and community events, the project has distributed more than 950 kits since its launch. As the project heads into its second year, public health staff encourage individuals, organizations or businesses interested in a training or obtaining free Narcan to contact 708.358.5480 or health@ oak-park.us. Blood donations needed... The U.S. is experiencing a national blood shortage and facing the lowest number of people giving blood in 20 years. The Oak Park Public Health Department is encouraging as many Oak Parkers as possible to give blood. Blood donations are needed now to alleviate the shortage and ensure lifesaving medical procedures are not delayed. One donation can save up to three lives. The Public Health Department along with other Village of Oak Park partners will be hosting blood donation events thought the summer and fall. Farmers' Market begins 49th season on May 18

he Oak Park Farmers' Market returns for its 49th season on May 18. The Market is held from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. every Saturday from opening day through October in the Pilgrim Congregational Church parking lot, 460 Lake St., one block west of Ridgeland Avenue. More than two dozen independent farmers and producers participate in the Farmers' Market, offering everything from fresh fruits and vegetables to meat, fish, cheese, eggs, flowers, bread, grains and honey. The Market also features donuts made on-site, fresh coffee and live bluegrass music. Non-profit bake sales are offered most Saturdays. A majority of vendors accept credit/ debit cards, as well as WIC and senior coupons. All vendors accept LINK cards. Special events are held throughout the season, starting



with Go Green Days on opening day and May 25 highlighting sustainability efforts in Oak Park. Support for Market administration comes from sales of a variety of items available at the information tent, including reusable shopping bags and t-shirts.
